

This week we've begun the first of a series of stories about the Planning Department's intention to implement a requirement created 20 years ago by the first city council that 50 named businesses in Malibu must apply for a Conditional Use Permit (CUP) if they want to keep operating. The planning department seems to be struggling with the issue about how they should notify these 50 businesses rather than the real question: is this something we really want to do? Are we prepared to follow, robot-like, a 20-year-old directive, or are we going to bring this back to the council for a complete, frank and open discussion about the future of these 50 named businesses? I'm beginning to suspect that some on the council are clueless about what's going on.

The Congress, on the other hand, seems to be coming out of its state of cluelessness with the understanding that Americans want them to act and actually start governing. Not only that, but they're actually beginning to see that it's also good politics to stop posturing and actually govern. Malibu's property taxes, business licenses, public health issues, animal services and a host of other community services are maintained by Los Angeles County.

PCH, our main street, and other main roads, like Malibu Canyon and Kanan, are maintained and funded by Cal Trans and the State of California, leaving our City Manager Jim Thorsen, Public Works Director Bob Brager and Assistant City Manager Reva Feldman twiddling their thumbs.

Christi Hogin, our city attorney, is another story. Hogin became a millionaire during her tenure with the city of Malibu.
