"We now know that many millions saw 'Son of God' this weekend and we are very encouraged by the overwhelming support for the film," Roma said. "We poured our hearts and souls into this project."

So what is it like working alongside your spouse? The talented couple said it actually brought them closer together. "This is a love story," Roma explains. "It has been a deeply personal journey for us.
